10	I ~ (to sing), if there was no school tomorrow.	10	I <b>would sing</b> , if there was no school tomorrow.
11	If I see you tomorrow I <b>will give</b> you back your CDs.	11	If I see you tomorrow I ~ (to give) you back your CDs.
12	I ~ (to stay) in bed all day, if I was ill.	12	I <b>would stay</b> in bed all day, if I was ill.
